5.1 INTRODUCTION

The Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka is situated on the left of the way to Samanalawewa reservoir and is over 160 kilometers away from Colombo – Badulla highway. The University comprises of six (06) Academic Faculties, namely,

In the year 2016, five faculties offered thirty three BA/BSc Degree Programmes, based on the Semester or the Course Units System of study, to a student population of about 3758. The annual intake of the University is in the region of about 1103 students. Apart from some of the Degree Programmes offered by the Faculties of Applied Sciences and Social Sciences, which are of three-year duration, the rest extend over to a four-year period. The medium of instruction of all Science – based programmes is English. Wherever possible, the Lecturers strive to assist undergraduates by presenting the relevant course materials in Sinhala or Tamil medium as the case may be. The students reading for degrees at the Sabaragamuwa University could also select optional courses even from another Department within their own Faculty (inter – departmental courses), while following the major and minor subjects.

The Faculty produces graduates in Agricultural Sciences and Management who are proficient in the sciences/disciplines and practical skill in agriculture to contribute towards the manpower requirements of the nation. The Faculty will strive to be the nucleus for socio-economic enhancement of the communities in geographic proximity to the Faculty.
BRIEF HISTORY:	The Faculty of Agricultural Sciences of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka was initially established at Rahangala in 1995 and was shifted to the main premises at Belihuloya in 2001. From 2001, academic programs were conducted with limited facilities at Belihuloya. In 2005, the faculty was able to win a competitive World Bank grant of Rs.82.5 million to develop infrastructure and other academic facilities. A comprehensive curriculum revision was undertaken and the degree programme was renamed as Agricultural Sciences and Management.

DEGREE PROGRAMME OF THE FACULTY:

The Faculty of Agricultural Sciences offers a four year honours degree, B.Sc. Agricultural Sciences and Management and students can specialize in four fields such as Agribusiness Management, Commercial Horticulture, Plantation Agriculture and Livestock Production.

The Faculty is composed of three Departments of study such as Agribusiness Management, Export Agriculture and Livestock Production. The Department of Export Agriculture offers two academic modules in Plantation Agriculture and Horticulture. The Agribusiness Management is a unique department as the undergraduate program in Agribusiness Management is the first of its kind in a Sri Lankan university.

During the first four semesters (first 2 years), students need to follow core-courses for their general study on Agriculture followed by specialization either in Plantation Agriculture, Horticulture, Livestock Production or Agribusiness Management for two more semesters (in the 3rd year). Students must select their field of specialization at the end of the second year, according to their preferences. Farm Practice, Computer Sciences and English courses are offered in the first three years and students must reach a satisfactory grade for each course in each semester to complete the degree. In addition, elective courses offered during the final year and students must select four elective courses according to their preferences during the first semester of their final year (in the fourth year). The final semester of the final year is allocated for industrial training, which is a vital and specific component of the degree program and must undertake an applied research in the specialized field. The medium of instruction of the degree program is English.

The Faculty organizes programs as the practical components of the degree programme in collaboration with farmers in the area to ensure that knowledge and skills are exchanged between students and farmers. As a result the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences has developed close links with the surrounding communities. Furthermore, students are given an opportunity to visit various industries to get exposure to operational aspects of the industry and research organizations.

Department of Agribusiness Management

The department is geared to develop students analytical, business and entrepreneurial skills to produce agro-entrepreneurs and agribusiness managers for the present and future.

Department of Export Agriculture

Department of Export Agriculture is to produce graduates who possess knowledge and skills in advanced agricultural technologies and are capable of managing horticultural and plantation operations of any scale.

Department of Livestock Production

The department strives to produce future leaders and innovators who can bear major responsibilities and perform the roles for the enhancement of the livestock sector.

The BAUC offered two diploma courses, one in Food Science and Technology and the other in English Language. With the elevation of the Affiliated University Colleges to fully fledged national Universities in early 1996, three Affiliated University Colleges; Sabaragamuwa Affiliated University College, Uva Affiliated University College and Buttala Affiliated University College were amalgamated to form the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka and the BAUC became the Faculty of Applied Sciences of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka.

With effect from March 2008, the faculty has been relocated in the main campus premises at Belihuloya.

DEGREE PROGRAMMES

The Faculty comprises five departments, Department of Natural Resources, Department of Physical Sciences and Technology, Department of Food Science and Technology, Department of Computing and Information Systems and the Department of Sport Sciences and Physical Education.

The Faculty offers B.Sc. (special) degree programmes in Food Science and Technology, Environmental Sciences & Natural Resource Management, Chemical Technology, Computer Science & Technology, Applied Physics, Computing and Information Systems, Sports Science and Management and Physical Education for the students who gain direct entry to the faculty on the basis of their performance at the GCE (A/L) Examination. The degree programs are designed to be four-year degree programs with an exit point at three years for the students who graduate with a general degree in B.Sc. in Physical Sciences and Technology and Environmental Sciences and Management. The rest of the degree programs are strictly four-year degree programs.

The selection of the students for the B.Sc. degree programmes in Computing and Information Systems, Sports Sciences and Management and Physical Education was performed on the basis of the G.C.E. (A/L) results as well as the performance at a selection aptitude test. The students who wish to get enrolled for the degree

programmes in Sports Sciences and Management and Physical Education were also required to face an examination for physical fitness in addition to the selection test. However, the selection procedure has been changed by the UGC through a circular and there will not be any further aptitude tests for the recruitment of undergraduates for the Faculty.

All degree programs offered through the faculty are designed to cater to the current job trends and demands both nationally and internationally. They are conducted exclusively in English. These degree programmes are designed as interdisciplinary by incorporating subjects as Computer Science, Economics, Management, etc. that has facilitated our students to perform well once graduating serving a wider field than being specific and narrowed to than specialized field.

Apart from the academic activities the Faculty also contributes to the development of the community and the nation through extension and knowledge Dissemination programmes. The staff and the students participate in such activities annually.

Department of Computing and Information Systems

The Department of Computing and Information Systems which offers a B.Sc. Special Degree in Computing and Information Systems was established in 01st March 2011, though the Degree programme was initiated back in 2008. The curriculum is specifically designed to produce skilled graduates both in Computing and Information Technology. At present the department has three well established laboratories and the student capacity of the department is 273.

The demand for the above degree programme has greatly increased thorough out the years and annual intake has reached the maximum capacity of 80 students per batch. The department has close collaborations with private computer industries to obtain technical support in conducting lectures and practical as well as to provide opportunities for the undergraduates to carry out their mini projects and final year projects. This also has increased the opportunity for the undergraduates to secure job opportunities immediately after graduation. The staff of the Department consists of one senior lecturer and five probationary lecturers.

Department of Food Science and Technology

The Department of Food Science and Technology was established in 2003 though the B.Sc. degree in Food Science and Technology was offered under the Department of Natural Resources since the inception of the Faculty in 1996. The range of the study areas include Food Science Technology core, General Sciences, Statistics, Computer Science & Technology, Marketing, Economics and courses in career development. The degree program is designed for the students who wish to pursue professional careers in the field of Food Science and Technology. The degree program has been designed in a manner that the graduates could cater to the growing demand for Food Scientists & Technologists both in government and private sector. The degree also paves an excellent path for postgraduate studies in related disciplines of Food Science and Technology. At present the Department comprises one professor, four senior lecturers, one lecturer, two probationary lecturers and two temporary lecturers. There are several eminent senior academics

and industrialists who contribute as visiting Professionals by conducting lectures and practical in their specialized fields. The Department has five well equipped laboratories namely; Food Analysis Laboratory, Food Microbiology Laboratory, Food Processing Laboratory, Meat Processing Laboratory and Dairy Processing Laboratory.

Department of Natural Resources

The Department of Natural Resources of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka was established in 1996 offering a B.Sc. General degree in Natural Resources. The degree program offered by this Department is designed to cater to the current job market in the fields of Environmental Protection, Natural Resource Management and Conservation, Biodiversity Conservation and Management, Environmental Advocacy and Ecology both in Sri Lanka and throughout the world.

In 2006 the Degree Programme which was initially offered as B.Sc. in Natural Resources a three-year general degree program was upgraded and restructured to offer a Degree programme as Environmental Sciences and Natural Resource Management which has improved the job opportunities for the graduates. Currently the degree program is oriented in three major streams viz. Environmental Sciences, Conservation Biology and Earth Sciences with awarding two degree programs as B.Sc. (Special) in Environmental Sciences and Natural Resource Management – 4 years and B.Sc. (General) in Environmental Science and Natural Resource Management – 3 years. The degree also paves an excellent path for postgraduate studies. The staff of the department consists of six Senior Lecturers, one Lecturer and one probationary lecturer. At present one lecturers is reading her Ph.D. studies overseas.

Department of Physical Sciences & Technology

The Department of Physical Sciences & Technology conducts degree courses in three major disciplines; namely, Chemical Technology, Applied Physics and Computer Science & Technology. Mathematics, Statistics, and Management Studies are conducted as supporting tools for the programme. The staff of the department consists of one senior professor in Physics, one Professor in Chemistry, two senior lecturers, nine probationary lecturers and two temporary lecturers. The Department offers four degree programmes namely: B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Chemical Technology (Duration: 4 years), B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Computer Science & Technology (Duration: 4 years), B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Special Degree in Applied Physics (Duration: 4 years) and B.Sc. (Applied Sciences) Degree in Physical Sciences (Duration: 3 years). All theoretical course units conducted by the department are heavily supported by a practical component which provides the preliminary experience to perform confidently. And also, the Mini projects conducted throughout the third and the fourth academic years stimulate the students' creative and innovative thinking. The Final year project (research or industrial training) for one entire semester exposes the undergraduates to the working environment and provides hand on experience in industry before the graduation. The environment in the campus and the teaching programmes were all designed in a manner to establish this goal and also to produce specialists in their respective fields. Additionally, it is also creditable that the Department offers the only Degree in Applied Physics in the entire University System in the country

Department of Sport Sciences and Physical Education

Two degree programmes namely B.Sc. Special Degree in Sport Sciences & Management and B.Sc. Special Degree in Physical Education have been awarded since 2008 through the Faculty of Applied Sciences. The Department of Sport Sciences and Physical Education was established in 01st March 2011. The courses of Sport Sciences & Management degree programme is specially designed to produce graduates with basic scientific sport skills and management skills required for today's teaching sports at primary, secondary and tertiary education levels and at other industries and organizations. The degree programme in Physical Education is specially designed to produce graduates who are competent the scientific basis of physical education activities and practices. The duration of the degree programmes are four years and at present there is a great demand for the degree programme which is significantly shown by the increasing number of student intake each year and at present the intake has reached the maximum capacity. The both degree programmes are well supported by practical activities and projects that has enabled to produce skilled and competent graduates within four years. The department also has many collaborations with sports organizations facilitating the students to participate in many national and international gaming competitions and coaching programmes. The staff comprises of one senior lecturer, one lecturer, ten probationary lecturers, one instructor and four temporary lecturers. The service of eminent sport specialist are also obtained to conduct both practical and theory courses for the students.

6.6 FACULTY OF SOCIAL SCIENCES AND LANGUAGES

VISION: The Vision of the Faculty is “To be a Centre of Academic and Intellectual Excellence for Arts Students so as to Equip Them to Contribute Productively to the Nation in its Path to Prosperity”

BRIEF HISTORY: The Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages had its beginning at the same time, when the University commissioned her study programs in 1996. The Faculty initially possessed two Departments of studies i.e. the Department of Languages and the Department of Social Sciences. The third Department of the Faculty, The Department of English Languages Teaching was initiated in 2004 while the fourth, The Department of Economics and Statistics commenced in 2009. The Department of Geography and Environmental Management was established as the fifth Department in 2015. The Faculty began its academic operations in November 1996 with the intake of students from the former affiliated University Collage, who were permitted, with their Diplomas in English, to study for a degree after two years. The Faculty started register students with Advanced Level qualification only from the year 1998.

In pursuit of its vision and mission, the Faculty offers Honors Degrees through its Departments. Breaking from the initial concept of three year Honors degrees in the Faculty, in 2007, the Faculty introduced four-year Honors Degree Programs in Economics, Statistics, Geography, Political Science, Sociology and Anthropology in addition to its three year Social Sciences Honors Degree Program. Four-year

Honors Degree Programs in Sinhala, Tamil, English, German, Japanese, Chinese and Hindi have also been introduced with effect from 2013. In 2014, the Faculty introduced Bachelor of Arts Honors in Information and

Communication Technology and in 2015, Bachelor of Arts Honors in Translation Studies. At present, the Faculty offers four-year Honors Degrees and three-year General Degrees only.

The Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages prepares students for professional careers, by providing them with a broad understanding of the humanistic tradition in combination with a sound knowledge of subjects in several disciplines. Our programs emphasize the ability to apply this knowledge to problems and tasks in the contemporary world of work. We strive to develop students' capacity for independent and critical thought, logical analysis, effective communication, and informed participation in teamwork. Therefore, the Bachelor of Arts program integrates classroom work and students' independent reading and writing with hands-on research and project work.

1. Profile

1.1. Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka Libraries

The Main Library provides its' services for the entire University to achieve the standard of excellence in their academic programs. The Management Faculty Library serves the needs of the Faculty of Management Studies. The Agricultural Sciences Library serves the needs of the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences. The collections and services of the library are designed to match the needs that range from basic support of the curriculum to the advanced research requirements of patrons.

The SUSL Libraries deliver customer focused quality information products, services and programmes, creatively adjust to changing information needs and innovatively respond to new challenges at national & international level.

The collection of books of all libraries in the end of 2016 was approximately 125,000 including purchased books, donation books received to the Library and pamphlets.

The SUSL Library is using KOHA open source software for Library automation. Collection has been organized as Lending Section, Reference Section, Permanent Reference Section, Periodical Section, Other Collection & Pass Paper Collections.

1.2. Vision, Mission & Objectives of the Libraries

Vision

Sabaragamuwa University Library serves as an entryway to global information, enabling direct and remote access to resources in a variety of formats. The library is a dynamic partner in the educational experience at the university, evolving to meet the changing needs of its diverse community of learners, while advancing towards the mission, values and vision of the university.

Mission

Advancing critical thinking and creativity for a diverse community of users building, organizing and maintaining focused collections for academic, creative and research interests and teaching users to identify locate access and effectively use a full range of information resources.

1.3. In House Activities

Library Committee

The Library Committee, the Sub-committee of the Senate is the principal management body of the Sabaragamuwa University Library. The Library Committee has been scheduled to be held on each and every month regularly. The Librarian plays the role of Secretary of the Committee. The Chairman of the committee is generally the Vice Chancellor of the University.

Objectives of the Libraries

In fulfilling the main objective of developing the university through self-studies and self-improvement, the university libraries in the country play a major role. The Sabaragamuwa University has three libraries: the library of the Faculty of Management Studies, the library of the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences and the Main Library. The main library serves the needs of three faculties at the moment - the Faculty of Social Sciences and Languages, the Faculty of Applied Sciences, and the Faculty of Geomatics. Those of the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences and Management Studies serve the needs of their clients. At present SUSL is actively involved in developing e-information provision.

7.2 CENTRE FOR COMPUTER STUDIES

Introduction

Centre for Computer Studies is the separate academic body for providing IT services to the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. It provides main services; such as IT academic work for faculty of Social Sciences and Languages, faculty of Management Studies and faculty of Agricultural Sciences, Internet facility with WIFI , e-mail facility, computer networking services, e-learning facilities, hardware & software maintenance services and developing software for the university.

History

The history of Sabaragamuwa University Computer Centre goes back to the time of inauguration of Affiliated University College (AUC) of Sabaragamuwa Province in 1991. It started at one of the residential building then own to Samanalawewa Hydro Electrical Power Project and now D1-4 quarters of Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. Initially, it equipped with 10 numbers of **Tatung** 286 computers featured 1Mb RAM, 40MB Hard disks and an **OKI** 9-pin dot-matrix printer and at the time of inauguration of AUC, late Hon. President Ranasinghe Premadasa unveiled the plaque of the centre.

At that time AUC enrolled students for Diploma programmes and conducted three diploma courses called *Diploma in Accounting & Finance*, *Diploma in Tourism Management* and *Diploma in English*. The **Core Course of Computing** offered by the computer centre was compulsory component to obtain the diploma for all programmes.

After some times, with the donation of Rs. 15,000/= from the then Balangoda District Judge who launched a program to donate funds for social works from the fines collected from the drugs victims, initiated to start the construction of existing computer centre building with the help of then staff, students and villagers by “Shramadana Campaign” and finally completed using the government funds. It was the first building constructed simultaneous with the old auditorium for the AUC in addition to the buildings acquiring from the Samanalawewa Project.

Initially it was recruited one staff member to computer centre as an *Instructor-in-Computer-Technology* for conducting the lectures and practical for the core course. Meanwhile, two other instructors were recruited to the computer centre cadre to extend the work it carried out and it was the only computer centre which had an approved cadre in the AUC system.

After upgrading the AUC into full-fledged national university as Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka in 1996, computer centre started to rendering its services to the different degree programs of different, especially for non-IT, faculties by means of designing and preparing course materials for IT related courses and conducting lectures and practical classes for it, helping to prepare and evaluate tender documents for purchasing of computers and other related equipments for the university, training of clerical staff of the university for effectively use of

computers for their day to day works as well as helping to academic staff for preparing their postgraduate thesis and in preparing teaching materials etc.

When expansion of the university and its functions, computer centre was renamed as **Centre for Computer Studies** and re-organized under a Director and started offering assistance for conducting IT related courses for the degree programmes especially for Faculty of Management Studies and Faculty of Social Sciences & Languages and constructed another building adjacent to the existing centre for broadening its services. At the same time university Local Area Network was planned and commissioned and got connected to the Internet via LEARN and started providing and maintaining the Internet and network services to the entire university community. Launching Sabaragamuwa University Web Site and providing E-Learning environment are such land marking services offered.

Meanwhile, to strengthen the services provided by the Centre for Computer Studies the cadre provisions has been increased and at present, below mentioned cadres are allocated to it according to the 2012 approved cadre list of UGC.

Among four of the permanent Instructors' in Computer Technology, three of them are assigned to the three faculties; Faculty of Agricultural Sciences, Faculty of Social Sciences & Languages and Faculty of Management Studies to conduct/instruct the IT related lectures/practical on request.

Mr. Chathuranga Wanigasekara is acting as a coordinator of the computer center of faculty of Management Studies and is maintaining the faculty and university web sites in addition to working as an instructor.

Mr. W.R.Y.S. Samarasekara conducting IT related lectures for the Faculty of Social Sciences & Language request of the respective Dean, in addition to the work done as a coordinator for the computer centre of the faculty of Social Sciences & Languages.

Mr. Pemawardena who is the Senior Instructor acted as an IT coordinator for the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences. Coordinators, who have participated in respective Faculty Boards, are coordinated with the Director of the Centre for Computer Studies to allocate human resources and other IT related services needed for the faculties. Three permanent cadre provisions have to be filled in future according to the requirements generated.

Assistant Network Manager (Mr. E.S.A. Gunasinghe and Mr. K.C.S. Ranasinghe) is responsible for maintaining and improving the performance of the university LAN as well as implementing new network services when required under the supervision of the Director.

Computer Applications Assistant and the Technical Officer are assigned for the solving of software and hardware problems of computers and accessories in faculty computer centers in addition to the other places such as centers, sections and offices of the entire university. Mr. Sanjeewa and Mr. Janaka are currently involving to do such work as well as to report about the faultier of equipments to the respective authorities to get decisions to repair them.

Present Status

Presently, on request of the different faculties, the academic services provided by the centre are mainly limed to conducting the IT Degree programme and computer minor programme of the Faculty of Social Sciences & Languages, some IT related subjects and practical components of the different departments of Faculty of

Management Studies and to the degree program in Computing and Information System of the Faculty of Applied Sciences. Other IT services such as Internet and web service are provided for entire university community. Other than that computer center providing maintain-support for services running in the network which are installed by other parties such as library system, IP Phone system, IP Camera system, Wireless network etc..

At present most of the faculties have built their own complexes and they have their own computer centers within them for conducting their IT related academic programs. Therefore, no need of using the existing buildings of the Centre for Computer Studies for conducting their programs further, instead they can be utilized for widen the services offered by the Centre such as conducting training programmes for non-academic and administrative staff as well as assisting the academic staff to fulfilling their IT-related needs. Nevertheless Staff development center also doing a training programme in the university.

The Centre for Computer Studies supervises all computer related academic activities in these five computer centers and maintains the campus-wide network including all the servers required to provide network services such as web ,e-learning ,DNS, email, library system , student information service and network troubleshooting services.

In year of 2013, infrastructure facilities and academic programs related with IT have further improved due to allocations from the consolidated fund by the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka. With this fund, the university managed to increase the Internet bandwidth from 20Mbps to 100Mbps and increase the number of computer facilities to all academic and administrative staff members at their work places.

Due to the high demand of the internet usage of the university, internet providers requested to increased bandwidth up to 225 Mbps. Accordingly the computer center proposed to increase the internal bandwidth of the fiber backbone.

Free Wi-Fi areas implemented for the students inside the university to provide a better learning environment to them. According to that all faculties covered with wi-fi facility.

Further, according to the annual plan University purchased more than 200 new computers and center helps to purchase and implement such computers in the university network.

Campus-Wide Network

Our campus-wide Local Area Network is run and maintained by the Centre for Computer Studies. It is administrated by our Assistant Network Managers within the server room. The server room consists of CISCO routers, proxy server, DNS server, CISCO switches, web server, e-learning sever, virus guard server (centralized server) etc. Performance of the network functions and the E-learning system are increased by upgrading the three servers namely Proxy, DNS and E-

learning during the year 2014. Separating and partitioning of the server room from the existing computer lab, physical security and the easiness of maintenance of the servers are assured. Also by commissioning the alternative power generating system using a 20KVA standby generator and 20KVA UPS system, availability of network functions are guaranteed during the 24 hours a day and 7 days a week.

All the five faculties are now inter-connected with fiber optic backbone and willing to upgrade the backbone in next year. At present our commodity Internet band with is 225Mbps and physical link is capable of handling signals of 100Mbps bandwidth.

- Implement/expand network of faculties, centers and offices
- Recruit a Technical officers for maintain the existing expanded network.

- a) The Computer center for provided the Internet facility to B- room complex
- b) The Computer center for provided the Internet facility to SDC building
- c) The Computer center for provided the Internet facility to Finance branch new building
- d) The Computer center for provided the Wi-Fi facility for Faculty of Social Science and languages.
- e) The Computer center for provided the Wi-Fi facility for Faculty of agriculture.
- f) The center staff successfully prepared a proposal and handed over it to the administration about the fiber backbone upgrade according to the high traffic demand.
- g) The center staff propose new network infrastructure changes by using layer 3 switches according to the fiber upgrade. Meanwhile network managers can isolate different traffic type in the network to avoid network congestion and slowness of the network. In this process many switches have to be replace with the gigabit supported switches and computer center decided to face out the solution as it will be high cost.
- h) Using one high end server implemented a virtual machine in side that server and hosted many services in one server to achieve go green concept.

- i) Continuously maintain 24* 7online Support service for the users who are using support system of the computer center. Further office hours cases are handling by providing very user friendly guideline via the emails.

Accommodation Facilities

As the University is in a low density area, considering the difficulties in finding the residential facilities for undergraduates by themselves, all the students whose permanent residencies are more than 20 km away from the University are provided hostel facilities by the University. So, about 89.96% of the undergraduates are received the University provided hostel facilities.

The University has provided accommodation in its own hostels only for about 1257 male students and 2124 female students out of 3381 residing students. All the other students have been provided with accommodation in rented houses in the vicinity with bare minimum facilities.

The University spends more than 14.54 million per annum for rented houses to accommodate the students.



Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Significant Accounting Policies

1.1 General Policies

1.1.1 Reporting Entity

Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka has been incorporated under the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 and located at P.O. Box 02, Belihuloya. This is a National university mainly operates on government funds.

1.1.2 Principal activities and nature of operations

The university primarily caters to local students in the fields of Agricultural Sciences, Social Sciences, Applied Sciences and Management Studies. The university is promoting higher studies and researches. Faculty of Graduate Studies initiated its operations during the year 2016.

1.1.3 Basis of preparation

(a) Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements comprise the statements of financial position, statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity, cash flow statements and notes to the financial statements.

The Financial Statements of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka are prepared in conformity with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards for the accrual basis of accounts. All accounting policies adopted by the University are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures.

(b) Basis of measurement

The Financial Statements of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka are prepared under the Historical Cost convention and do not take into account of changes in money values, except where it is stated.

(c) Functional and presentation currency

The Financial Statements are presented in Sri Lankan Rupees, which is the University's functional and presentation currency.

(d) Going concern

The Financial Statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

1.2 Assets and the basis of their valuation

1.2.1 Property, Plant & Equipment

Lands, Buildings, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Fixtures & Fittings, Library Books and Periodicals, Motor Vehicles, Cloaks and Other Assets include the items acquired out of government grant, research grants, internally generated funds, and donations.

a) Basis of Recognition and Measurement

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be reliably measured. Properties, plant and equipments are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation. The cost of property, plant and equipment is the cost of purchase or construction together with any incidental expenses thereon.

b) Cost

The cost of property, plant and equipment comprises its purchase or construction cost and any directly attributable cost of bringing the assets working condition for its intended use.

c) Subsequent expenditure on existing Fixed Assets

Expenditure incurred on tangible fixed assets is charged to the Statement of Financial Performance in the period it is incurred, unless it meets one of the following criteria, in which case it is capitalized and depreciates on the relevant basis.

- Market value of fixed assets has subsequently increased.
- Asset capacity increase.
- Sustainable improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating cost.
- Significant extension of the asset life beyond that confirmed by repair and maintenance.

d) Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on a Straight-Line Method over the estimated useful life of Property, Plant and Equipment items from the date that they were made available for use. Lands are not depreciated. The estimated useful life periods are as follows.

Depreciation is provided in full in the year of purchase and no depreciation is charged in the year of disposal. This method of depreciation is adopted in using the rates in the UGC circular 649 from the financial year 2006 and hope to continue in future. Also this method of calculation of depreciation was approved by our Council at its 117th meeting held on 20.01.2007.

The vehicle No. SG KE 9206, Motor car purchased in 2007 was fully damaged and condemned in 2016. The National Insurance Trust Fund agreed to provide maximum value of Rs. 2,650,000.00 as insurance recovery in the near future. Hence, the amounting to Rs. 2,650,000.00 has been accounted as insurance receivable in the statement of financial position and net value of the cost & insurance receivable has been charged to the statement of financial performance in 2016.

e) **Capital Works in Progress**

Capital work-in-progress is stated at cost. These are expenses of a capital nature directly incurred in the construction of property, plant and equipment awaiting capitalisation. Capital work-in-progress would be transferred to the relevant asset category in property, plant and equipment, when it is available for use i.e., when it is in the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by the university.

1.2.2 **Intangible Assets**

An Intangible asset is recognized only when its cost can be measured reliably and it is probable that the expected future economic benefits that are attributable to it will flow to the company.

Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and any accumulated impairment losses. Subsequent expenditure is capitalized only when it increase the future economic benefits embodied in the assets. All other expenditure is expensed as incurred.

All intangible assets are considered to have a finite useful life and amortized using straight line method to write down the cost of intangible asset to their residual values over their estimated useful lives as follows.

a. Computer software is amortised over a period of 5 years on straight-line basis.

b. Cost of development of new curriculum is amortised over a period of 5 years on Straight-line basis from the effective date of the new curriculum.

Intangible assets represent the software purchased under the HETC grant on their written down value and software purchased by the entity during the current financial year.

1.2.3 Curriculum Revision

The university revises the curriculum for all degree programs in every five years and amendments are not making within that period. Hence, the expenditure incurred on capital funds are amortize over the five years period on the basis that the economic benefits would flow to the university during the effective period of the new syllabus .Since the faculty of Management Studies and Faculty of Geomatics have implemented the revised curriculum w.e.f. 2015, the expenditure incurred on that are amortizes w.e.f. 2015. Also since the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences and the Faculty of Applied Sciences have implemented the revised curriculum w.e.f. 2016, the expenditure incurred on that are amortizes w.e.f. 2016.

1.2.4 Knowledge Enhancement

The expenditure incurred to enhance the knowledge of the employees is treated as capital expenditure and amortize over 5 year period.

1.2.5 Livestock

Livestock are revalued and revaluation surplus / deficit charged to the statement of financial performance.

1.2.6 Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. In general, cost is determined on a first in first out basis and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their existing condition and location.

1.2.7 Receivables

Receivables are stated at the amounts they are estimated to realize.

1.2.8 University Research Grant

As per the SLPSAS 20, no intangible asset arising from research phase of an internal project shall be recognized. Expenditure on research phase activities shall be recognized as an expense when it is incurred. An intangible assets arising from development phase of an internal project shall be recognized if an only if the entity can demonstrate the recognition

criteria. This Standard is adopted from the current financial year with retrospectively and hope to continue in future.

The university has allocated funds to enhance research and development activities under the annual capital budget. The total amount spent for the research phase activities are shown as an expense in statement of financial performance. The aggregate amount of research expenditure recognized as expenditure during the year of 2016 is Rs.5, 611,980.

Also the amount spent for research phase activities and recognized as an asset for the year 2015 was Rs. 555,745.00 which is recognized as an expense and adjusted surplus and deficit of 2015 during the current financial year due to the adoption of SLPSAS 20 retrospectively.

1.2.9 Cash & cash equivalents

Cash & cash equivalents comprise cash deposits at banks.

1.3 Liabilities & Provisions

All known liabilities as at the balance sheet date are included in the financial statements and adequate provisions are made for liabilities which are known to exist but the amount of which cannot be determined accurately.

Obligations payable on demand or within one year of the balance sheet date are treated as current liabilities in the balance sheet. Liabilities payable after one year from the balance sheet date are treated as noncurrent liabilities in the balance sheet.

1.3.1 Employee Benefits

(a) Defined Benefit Plans

Defined benefit plans estimate the amount of benefit that an employee will receive on retirement

Provision for retiring Gratuity

The university has adopted the benefit plan as required under the payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983 for all eligible employees.

Defined benefit plans define an amount of benefit that an employee will receive on retirement usually dependent on one or more factors such as age, years of service and compensation. In order to meet this liability, a provision carried forward as at the reporting date, amount calculated based on an internal management assessment. Accordingly liability recognizes for the employees who have completed 5 years of service in the university system as at the reporting date. The resulting difference between brought forward provision as at the beginning of the period net of any payments made, and the

carried forward provision at the end of the period is dealt with in the statement of profit and loss.

The gratuity liability are not externally funded nor actuarially valued.

(b) Defined Contribution Plans

A defined contribution plan is a post-employment plan under which an entity pays fixed contribution into a separate entity and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay a further amount. Obligations for contributions to defined contribution plans are recognized as an expense in the statement of comprehensive income as and when they are due.

University Provident Fund (UPF) & University Pension Fund

The university and employees, contribute 15% or 7% and 10% respectively, on the salary of each employee to the University provident fund in line with the respective statutes and legislation in Sri Lanka and University Act. Also the university contributes 8% to the University Pension Fund in respect of pensionable employees.

Employees' Trust Fund (ETF)

The university contributes 3% on the salary of each employee to the Employees' Trust Fund.

1.3.2 Leases

Finance Lease

A lease is classified as a finance lease if it transfers substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership.

Initial Recognition and Subsequent Measurement

Initially, assets held under financial lease and financial lease liabilities are recognized as assets and liabilities in the statement of financial position at their minimum lease payments.

Subsequent lease payments are apportioned between the finance charge and the reduction of the outstanding liability using the effective interest method.

1.3.3 Accounting for Grants

Grants that compensate the University for Expenses incurred are recognized as revenue in the income statement in the same period in which the expenses are recognized. Grants that compensate the University for the Cost of an asset are recognized in the income statement on a systematic basis over the useful life of the related asset.

As per Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Slander 20 the university adopted income approach accounting principal when identifying capital grants and donations w.e.f. 2014.01.01 and hope to continue in future.

1.3.4 Contingent Liabilities

Below mentioned all court cases are ongoing and we have to incur legal fees. Some compensation cannot be estimated at the moment. Therefore, no provision has been made in the accounts with regard to liabilities arising out of litigation. Ongoing court cases as at the balance sheet date are stated below.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka for the year ended 31 December 2016 in terms of the Section 108(1) of the Universities Act, No.16 of 1978

The audit of financial statements of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka for the year ended 31 December 2016 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2016 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Sub-section 107(5) of the Universities Act No.16 of 1978. My comments and observations which I consider should be published with the Annual Report of the University in terms of Sub-section 108(1) of the Universities Act appear in this report. A detailed report in terms of Sub-section 108(2) of the Universities Act was furnished to the Vice Chancellor of the University on 26 July 2017.

1.2 Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair preparation of these financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements whether due to fraud or error.

1.3 Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these statements based in my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards consistent with International Auditing Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAI 1000-1810). Those Standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial are free from material misstatements.



An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the University's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's Internal Control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. Section 111 of the Universities Act, No.16 of 1978 give discretionary powers to the Auditor General to determine the scope and extent of the audit.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

1.4 **Basis for Qualified Opinion**

My opinion is qualified based on the matters described in paragraph 2.2 of this report.

2. **Financial Statements**

2.1 **Qualified Opinion**

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described 2.2 of this report, the financial statements give of a true and fair view of the financial position of the Sabaragamuwa University of Sri Lanka as at 31 December 2016 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

2.2 **Comments on Financial Statements**

2.2.1 **Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards**

Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 02

The following observations are made.

- (a.) A sum of Rs.2,625,798 received in cash during the year under review as interest income had been shown as Rs.8,042,860 under the investment income in the cash flow statement and as a result the cash generated from the investment activities had been overstated by a sum of Rs.5,417,062. Thus the balances of this cash flow statement has become a problematic situation in audit.



- (b.) The payment of interest on the lease installments of the year under review amounting to Rs.2,244,287 had not been shown under the financial activities of the cash flow statement.
- (c.) In terms of paragraph 31 of the Standard, the cash receipts and the cash payments relating to the investment and financial activities should be shown separately in the financial statements. Nevertheless, the cash receipts and cash payments relating to 12 Fund Accounts had been set-off and the balance had been shown under the financial activities as debit and credit balances amounting to Rs.2,991,521 and Rs.1,096,129 respectively.
- (d.) A sum of Rs.151,377,090 paid for the purchase of property, plant and equipment and a sum of Rs.59,596,728 paid for the work-in-progress during the year under review had been shown under the investment activities as Rs.152,930,989 and Rs.62,510,486 respectively. As such the cash flows had been overstated by a sum of Rs.4,467,658.

2.2.2 Accounting Deficiencies

A sum of Rs.334,750 paid as personal emoluments in respect of the preceding year of the Open and Distant Education Centre had been brought to account as an expenditure of the year under review and as such the surplus for the year under review had been overstated by that amount.

2.2.3 Lack of Evidence for Audit

The evidence indicated against the following items of account had not been produced to the Audit for the confirmation of those items of account.

2.3 Accounts Receivable and Payable

- (a.) A sum of Rs.373,329 receivable from 10 employees relating to 19 loan balances existing over periods ranging from 01 year to 17 years had not been recovered.
- (b.) Action had not been taken to settle the employees loan adjustments amounting to Rs.77,900 brought forward from the year 2010.
- (c.) The courses of action required to be taken for the recovery of the sundry debtors balances amounting to Rs.105,525 existing from the periods prior to the year 2003 had not been taken.
- (d.) The sundry deposits amounting to Rs.358,897 receivable from the external parties existing from the year 2012 had not been recovered.

2.4 Non-compliance with Laws, Rules, Regulations and Management Decisions

The following non-compliances were observed during the course of audit.

<u>Reference to Laws, Rules, Regulations, etc.</u>	<u>Non-compliance</u>
(a.) Section 122(1) of the Universities Act No.16 of 1978	- Even though the Council of Students Consisting of the Students representatives selected from among the persons who remained as students of the University for the time being should be established, the Student Councils had not been made functional due to the failure to appoint even by June 2017 the Senior Treasurers to the Students Councils of 05 Faculties, the periods of which had expired in April 2016.
(b.) Financial Regulations of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka Financial Regulation 571 (1), (2) and (3)	- The necessary courses of action had not been taken to carry out an age analysis of the deposits, retention money and bid securities totaling Rs.15,100,847 existing from the year 2011 to the year 2015 and settle the lapsed deposits.



(c.) Establishments Code for the University

Higher Education

(i.) Section 7.6 of Chapter V

- The liquidated damages amounting to Rs.60,346,783 recoverable from 15 officers who had proceeded abroad on study leave during the period from the year 2000 to the year 2016 and failed to report back to service had not been recovered.

(ii.) Section 3.1 of Chapter XX

- A sum of the Rs.468,595,919 had been paid in the year under review as the salaries and allowances of 259 members of the Academic Staff for the year under review without obtaining confirmation of their times of Arrival and Departure.

(d.) Section 7.2 of the Public Enterprises
Circular No.PED/12 of 02 June 2003

- The Operating Hand books covering all operating areas of the University had not been prepared.

3. Financial Review

3.1 Financial Results

According to the financial statements presented, the financial results of the University for the year 2016 amounted to a surplus of Rs.39,224,605 as against the deficit for the preceding year amounting to Rs.22,927,315 and as such the financial results for year 2016 as compared with the year 2015 indicated an improvement of Rs.62,151,920. The increase of the Government recurrent grants by a sum of Rs.127,391,842 and the other income by a sum of Rs.11,118,033 had been the main reason for the above improvement.

An analysis of the financial results for the year under review and 04 preceding years indicated that the deficit of Rs.96,632,028 for the year 2012 had decreased to Rs.22,927,315 by the year 2015 with fluctuations. Nevertheless, that had improved to a surplus of Rs.39,224,605 by the year 2016. Nevertheless, with the readjustment of the employees' remunerations and the depreciation on the non-current assets to the financial results the contribution of Rs.395,954,737 in the year 2012 had continuously improved to Rs.1,066,638,982 by the year 2016.

3. Operating Review

4.1 Performances

According to Section 28 of the Universities Act, No.16 of 1978, the enrolment of students, the conduct of examinations for the determination of the persons who had achieved proficiency in different academic areas, functioning in co-operation with the other Universities in Sri Lanka and in foreign countries, the conduct of Postgraduate Degree Courses, the conduct of Postgraduate Degrees to those who have passed the examinations, the conduct of External Examination with the concurrence of the Commission and the award of Degrees to the persons who have passed those examinations are the major functions and duties of the University.

The following observations are made in this connection.

(a.) Registration of Internal Students to the University

Even though the number of students proposed for registration in the three preceding Academic Years had been 3,356, out of that 3,176 students only had been registered and as such there were vacancies of 380 students or 11 per cent of the number of students proposed for registration.

(b.) Registration of Students for the Bachelor of Arts (External) Degree Course

The following observations are made.

(i.) According to the Commission Circular No.932 dated 15 October 2010 of the University Grants Commission, the above course should have been modernised and commenced after the year 2011. Even though 05 years had elapsed after the issue of the above circular, action had not been taken for the modernization of the Course and enroll new students even by 31 May 2017.

(ii.) Even though a period exceeding 05 years had elapsed after the last enrolment of students to the above course in the year 2011, the third year examination for that group had not been conducted even by 31 May 2017. In view of this situation, out of 185 students registered for this course in that year, 125 students or 66 per cent had abandoned the course as at present.

(c.) Out of 79 students registered for the Academic Year 2014/2015 of the Department of Animal Production of the Faculty of Agricultural Science, 76, 15 and 11 students respectively had not qualified for the First Semester Examination in 03 subjects, namely Genetics Science, the Bio-Chemistry Science and Food Science and the Technology Principles. The necessary courses of action had not been

taken to ascertain the reasons for the existence of such situation and for rectification.

- (d.) Even though 2,319 students out of 2,708 students registered in the 03 preceding years had completed the Degree, 14 per cent of the students registered had failed in those Academic years to complete the Degree.

4.2 Management Activities

Instead of preparing a suitable course of action in collaboration with the 03 Local Authority of the area in connection was the management of about 02 tons of Waste generated by the University daily, such waste had been disposed of with effect from January 2015 to the Nonpareil Land without separating the waste as degradable waste and non-degradable waste. Such waste had spread to different places in the area and as such the possibility of creating environmental pollution as well as adverse conditions to the wildlife was observed.

4.3 Operating Activities

The following activities are made.

- (a.) Even though University had been using the Water Purification Plant with the capacity for providing the daily needs of water for 1,500 persons constructed in the year 1986 for the Samanala Wewa Reservoir Scheme, the water purification system of the Water Purification Plant had become inactive since August 2015. In such circumstances, the water from Hirikatu Oya had been obtained direct to the tank and distributed by mixing with chlorine. According to the reports of the monthly tests of the presence of bacteria in the water carried out by the institution revealed that the water does not conform to the specific quality. As such the supply pure water fit for drinking water to about 7,300 students and the staff of the University had become a problem.
- (b.) Action had not been taken even by May 2017 to complete the construction of the tube well partly constructed at a cost of Rs.1,050,196 near the Women's Hostel in the year 2014 for fulfilling the water requirement of the University.

4.4 Underutilization of Funds

The balance of Rs.7,930,105 of 05 Funds of University had been idling over periods ranging from 02 years to 06 years without being utilized for specific objectives.

4.5 Idle and Underutilized Assets

The following observations are made.

- (a.) The Lecture Hall situated in the Farm of the Faculty of Agricultural Science constructed in the year 2014 at a cost of Rs.6,720,833 outside the Master Plan of the University and without carrying out a feasibility study with the expectation of enrolling additional students had been idling without being utilized.
- (b.) Even though the Higher Education for Twenty First Century Project had given goods and equipment valued at Rs.2,725,000 to the University in the year 2016 for the establishment of the Out-Bound Training Centre of the Faculty of Applied Sciences of the University such equipment had been underutilized even by 31 May 2017 as the Infrastructure Facilities and Plans for that purpose had not been prepared.
- (c.) The Sports Goods, Office Equipment and Library Books valued at Rs.1,262,584 given to the University in the years 2013, 2014,2015 and 2016 by the Higher Education for Twenty First Century Project had been stored in the Operating Technical Services Centre closed down at present, even by May 2017 without being utilized.

4.6 Uneconomic Transactions

Even though the Cabinet of Ministers had, by the decision dated 24 August 2005, granted the approval for the construction of an Information Technology Building at a cost of Rs.121 Million the approval for that had been granted again in the year 2007. The decision for the construction had been changed after spending a sum of Rs.1,819,966 in the year 2010 for the preparation of building designs and commencement of work. As such the expenditure had become fruitless.

4.7 Procurement and Contract Process

The following observations are made.

- (a.) The Stadium and the Pavilion of the University constructed in the year 2014 at a cost of Rs.123,052,693 had not been constructed in a manner fit for sports and as such rain water collected was not flowing out. The development of the surface of the stadium with gravel mixed earth had resulted in a hard surface and due to that reason and the lack of maintenance had resulted in the inability for the Students use it for sports activities. The cracked retaining wall near the pavilion had not been repaired. The necessary courses of action had not been taken even by May



2017 to repair the stadium by utilizing the retention money amounting to Rs.5,156,160.

- (b.) In the preparation of the cost estimate of Rs.945,789 for inviting bids for the construction of the drain near the staff canteen, rates with adjustments for the current prices had been used. Accordingly as compared with the rates of the Sabharagamuwa Provincial Council an excess estimate of Rs.91,346 had been made.

4.8 Staff Administration

The following observations are made.

- (a.) There were 36 vacancies in the Academic Staff as at 31 December of the year under review comprising 04 vacancies in the posts of Professors and 32 vacancies in the posts of Lecturers. In view of the failure to take action for filling those vacancies even by June 2017, a sum of Rs.19,437,369 had to be paid to 106 Visiting Lecturers during the year under review. Excesses in the Academic posts consisting of post of Assistant Professor, 07 posts of Lecturers, 13 posts of Temporary Demonstrators/ Instructors and 18 Consultants were also observed.
- (b.) There were 116 vacancies consisting of one post of Administrator, 02 posts of Library Officers 31 posts in the Academic Assistant Staff and 80 posts in non-academic posts as at 31 December of the year under review. Action had not been taken even by June 2017 to fill those vacancies and as such a sum of Rs.16,811,999 had to be paid as holiday pay and overtime during the year under review.

5. Accountability and Good Governance

5.1 Corporate Plan

Even though a Strategic Management Committee had been established for the measurement of the physical progress of the Corporate Plan, that Committee had not reviewed 117 activities out of 150 activities of the plant even by May 2017.

5.2 Action Plan

The Action Plan relating to the year 2016 had not been prepared as presented in paragraph 04 of the Public Finance Circular No.01/2014 of 17 February 2014. The Performance Reports had not been prepared for the measurement of the physical progress of the year 2016.

5.3 Internal Audit

A Senior Assistant Internal Auditor and a Clerk only had been deployed in the Internal Audit Division and as such the planning and implementation of the Internal Audit covering all the areas of the University had been a problem.

5.4 Budgetary Control

The estimated provisions for capital expenditure amounted to Rs.790 million and the actual expenditure therefrom amounted to Rs.244 million. As such of Rs.546 million or 69 per cent of the provision had been saved. Accordingly, it was observed that the budget had not been made use of as an effective instrument of financial controls.

5.5 Tabling of Annual Reports

Action in terms of Section 110 of the Universities Act, No.16 of 1978 had not been taken for the tabling of the Annual Reports for the years 2013 and 2014 in Parliament.

6. Systems and Controls

Weaknesses in the systems and controls observed during the course of audit were brought to the notice of the Vice Chancellor of the University from time to time. Special attention is needed in respect of the following areas of controls.
