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PREFACE

The fisheries industry is a key sector in Sri Lanka which is capable of making a greater contribution towards the GDP of the country. The sector fulfills the requirements of nutritional intake of the people while constituting livelihood of about 2 million population. The Department of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources is the main institute that has the responsibility for development and management of fisheries sector during different period of time through various methodologies.

Currently, the attention of the Department is mainly focused on directing fisher folks towards a responsible fisheries industry in compliance with international conventions, laws and rules. Nevertheless, a host of activities and programmes aiming at developing the socio-economic status of fisher folk were launched in the year under review and it is expected to improve the capability of fisher folk to exploit high quality fish harvest by means of upgrading their livelihood.

In addition, one of the main roles of the Department is to protect and regulate the regenerating but limited fisheries and aquatic resources for future generation through proper management of fishing fleet and fishing gear.

It is observed that the Department of Fisheries was able to achieve the set targets in an optimum manner in order to meet the above objectives during the year 2014. However, I am in the belief that more productive outcomes could be achieved by linking the day today functions and progress review process with information technology.

<u>Department of Fisheries & Aquatic Resources.</u> <u>Performance Report – 2014</u>

1.1. Mission

Sustainable development of fisheries industry through the application of new technology and sound management of resources in conformity with the international marine laws and conventions for making an effective contribution to the National Economy of Sri Lanka.

1.2. Objectives

- To manage, regulate, conserve and develop fisheries activities in a sustainable manner in conformity with national and international laws and conventions.
- To promote local and foreign investments.
- To introduce new technology in the exploitation of fishery resources in the national and international waters.
- To uplift socio economic status of the fisher folk.
- To certify quality and safety of the fish products for export in conformity with international standards.
- To minimize post-harvest losses and improve the quality of local fish products.

1.3. Strategies

- Introduction and implementation of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Act No. 02 of 1996 and Fisheries (Regulation of Foreign Boats) Act No. 59 of 1979 in accordance with current trends and international laws and conventions.
- Creation of groundwork to attract investment from the foreign and local business community for the development of fisheries sector.
- Proper coordination with related institutions to introduce new technology for the development of the fisheries industry.
- Establishment of an IT based extension service to take the local and foreign funded development projects, community development programmes and the results of scientific studies and researches to the fishing community.
- Giving priority for the participation of fisher community in the management of fisheries development programmes, projects and resources through active involvement of government, non government and community organizations.
- Strengthening the necessary institutional arrangements for improving infrastructure facilities and provision of training for minimizing post-harvest losses and upgrading the quality and standards of local and export fish products.
- Providing necessary incentives to obtain total commitment and support of fisher women and men for uplifting the socio economic status of fisher households.

1.4. Functions

- Framing, updating and implementing of fisheries operational regulations, fisheries management regulations and aquaculture management regulations.
- Registration of fishing boats and issue of fishing operational licences.
- Action relating to the mortgaging of fishing boats.
- Issue of licences for the export of live fish.
- Issue of licences to foreign fishing boats for the landing of fish.
- Enhancing the understanding about fishery management.
- Co-ordination of loan facilities for the purchase of capital goods.
- Registration of boat builders, manufactures of fishing gear, sales agents and agents for boat engines.
- Calling quotations for boats, engines and gear and approving the same.
- Guidance and supervision of fisheries cooperative societies to enhance their efficiency.
- Formulation of development projects for fisheries cooperatives and the establishment of fisheries (Idiwara) banks.
- Improve the understanding and awareness of fishing communities.
- Collection of data related to the fisheries industry
- Repatriation of fishermen arrested by foreign countries or stranded at high seas.
- Registration of fish processing establishments and testing the quality of fish exports.
- Upgrading the standard of local fish sale outlets.

1.5. Organizational structure

The Department of Fisheries & Aquatic Resources which comes under the purview of the Ministry of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources is administered by a Director General. The functions of the Department have been divided into six divisions for efficient delivery of services.

- 1. Fisheries Management Division.
- 2. Fisheries Industries Division.
- 3. Fishery Products Quality Control Division.
- 4. Monitoring, Controlling & Surveillance Division.
- 5. Administration Division.
- 6. Finance Division.

The functions of these divisions are executed by four Directors and two Deputy/Assistant Directors. Fifteen District Assistant Director Offices have been set up covering coastal districts and the functions of each such district are carried out under the guidance and supervision of the respective Assistant Director of the District. Furthermore, 133 Fisheries Inspector Offices have been set up covering all the coastal areas of the relevant divisions. All the activities of such fisheries divisions are undertaken by fisheries inspectors, fisheries social development assistants and fisheries resources management assistants. Similarly, 20 divisional monitoring centers have been established at fishery harbours and radio officers have been attached to such centers for day and night duties.

2. Fisheries Management Division

2.1 Objective:-

Main objective of this division is to attain a sustainable development in the fisheries sector of Sri Lanka by way of conservation and management of fishery resources in seas, lagoons and reservoirs through community participation.

2.2 Functions:-

The following functions are performed by the division for achieving the above objective.

- Formulation and implementation of fisheries regulations
- Registration of fishing vessels
- Mortgage of fishing vessels
- Issuance of fisheries operational licenses
- Issuance of fish landing permits for foreign vessels
- Issuance of import, export and re-export permits for ornamental fish
- Issuance of permits for catching, possession, transportation and export of lobsters and beach de-mer.
- Issuance of permits for transport and export of chanks
- Issuance of permits for transportation and export of chanks, sea shells and shark fins
- Registration of Beach Seine Harbours and owners and issue of permits for beach seines
- Issuance of identity cards for fishermen
- Repatriation of fishermen stranded and apprehended in foreign countries
- Provision of dry rations for affected fisher families
- Formulation and implementation of fisheries development and management plans through the fisheries management communities and authorities established in the designated management areas
- Establishment of fisheries organizations and fishery management committees at landing sites, divisional secretariat and provincial level and national level committees, and formulation and implementation of fisheries development plans through them.
- Training of multiday boat skippers
- Collection and analysis of data on fisheries industry & fisher folk
- Settlement of disputes in fisheries sector.
- Making the boat owners, skippers and crews engaged in high seas fishing operations aware of the rules and the conventions relating to the regional agreements.
- Making the fishers and boat owners engaged in coastal fishing activities aware of the strategies and rules for a responsible fisheries industry.
- Training and making aware of the fisheries officers and other stakeholders about the rules and regional conventions relating to the high seas and coastal fisheries industry.

03. Fisheries Industries Division

3.1. Objective:-

Main objective of this division is to develop fisheries industry in a sustainable manner by using modern technology in accordance with timely trends, assist to obtain high quality fish products and minimize post-harvest losses by providing various credit facilities for fisheries sector, maintain rural fisheries societies and fisheries cooperative societies established under the National Federation of Fisheries and to implement various programmes for the upliftment of socio welfare of fisher folks.

3.2. Responsibility and Role:-

- Development of fisheries industry through modern technology.
- Implementation of various development programmes for fisher folk.
- Implementation of Idiwara bank and Fisheries Co-Operative Society programmes and co-ordination and supervision of them at national level.
- Registration of manufacturers of fishing vessels and importers of fishing gear, boat engines, refrigeration systems, navigational, communicational and lifesaving equipment and fixing their prices and renewal of such permits annually.
- Approval of designs of fishing boats, various makes & models of marine engines and other equipment used for fishing.
- Providing relief to the fishermen who are at distress due to terrorist attacks.
- Formulation and implementation of programmes to uplift the living standard of fishing families affected by natural disasters and accidents.
- Supervision of all district and regional fisheries offices.
- Follow up action on projects funded by foreign aids.
- Preparation of annual action plan of departmental activities.

3.3. **Performance in 2014:-**

3.3.1. "Diyawara Diriya"-Loan scheme of the Bank of Ceylon:-

The 2nd stage of Diyawara Dirirya low interest fisheries development loan scheme is being successfully implemented by the Bank of Ceylon and the Department of Fisheries & Aquatic Resources. The loan in the range up to 10 Million Rupees is based on the total loan value.

Interest rates

- Less than 2 Million Rupees 12 %
- Higher than 2 Million Rupees 14 %
- 4 per cent out of the interest rate is paid by the government for all loans issued, under the government subsidy.

Progress-loans valued at Rupees 198.2 Million have been granted for 106 beneficiaries while 967 applications have been handed over to the Bank of Ceylon.

3.3.2. Fisheries Insurance Scheme:-

Fisheries insurance scheme has been introduced on behalf of the fishers and fishing boats for the purpose of mitigating the risk nature and ensuring financial stability in the fisheries sector.

3.3.5. Divi neguma Programme:-

Fisheries post-harvest activities are implemented successfully under the Divi Neguma programme in collaboration with the Ministry of Economic Development. Under this programme Rupees 10,000/- loan amount has been granted to the selected beneficiaries for the livelihood development projects.

3.3.6. Alternative Fuel Subsidy Scheme:-

The Government granted monthly fuel subsidy to the owners of mechanized fishing crafts actively engaging in the fishing operations and registered with the Department of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources in order to minimize the impact on the fisheries industry owing to the increase of fuel prices in the year 2012. The alternative fuel subsidy scheme has been proposed since this year as the most effective way for the development of the fisheries industry by introducing new technology in place of this fuel subsidy scheme.

04.Fishery Products Quality Control Division.

4.1. <u>Purpose:-</u>

This division was established under the Department of Fisheries & Aquatic Resource and has been functioning since 04.01.1999 for the purpose of fulfilling the requirements laid down by the European Commission with regard to export of fish/fishery products from Sri Lanka.

4.2. Objectives:-

The main objective of this unit is to ensure the high quality and safety of fish products exported to the international market by Sri Lanka for human consumption under the implementation of Fish Products (Export) Regulations gazetted in 1998.

4.3. Activities:-

To achieve the set objectives the following activities are being undertaken by the Quality Control Division.

- Issuance of licenses for fish processing establishments.
- Issuance of operating licenses for establishments to process fish for export.
- Regular inspection of fish processing establishments.
- Inspection of landing sites.
- Inspection of fishing boats supplying fish for export.
- Inspection of transportation of fish (raw materials) from landing sites to the processing plants.
- Issuance of health certificates for each consignment of fish/ fishery products for export.
- Approval of laboratories issuing test reports for ensuring the safety of export fish products.
- Conduct the official sampling programme in order to test the samples obtained from relevant places, at the laboratories.
- Taking appropriate action whenever necessary against the processing establishments, boats & landing sites not complying with the conditions laid down in the regulations.
- Taking appropriate action against the complaints received with regard to the lack of safety of fish products to be exported.
- Organizing and conducting awareness programmes on the quality & safety of fish and fishery products as well as on fish handling for the crews in boats which are supplying fish for export.
- Organizing and conducting awareness programmes in order to control antibiotics and chemicals used for aquaculture products (Prawns) under the residue monitoring programme of aquaculture products.
- Issue of fish catch certificates.

4.4. Progress – 2014

4.4.1. Fish production, quality control and minimizing of post-harvest loss. 4.4.2. Registration of new fish processing establishments and renewal of registration.

Renewal of registration of 35 fish processing establishments and fish packaging centers was done by the Department of Fisheries & Aquaculture in 2014.

05. Monitoring, Controlling & Surveillance Division

5.1. Objective:

Main objective of this Division is to protect fishing community by way of providing communication transmission facilities for the exchange of radio signals in between fishing vessels engaged in fishing operation in and off the Exclusive Economic Zone of Sri Lanka and the land, rescuing fishermen and fishing crafts affected due to the engine trouble, accidents and falling sick at the sea, lifesaving and taking any other urgent preventive measures and facilitating to claim insurance cover in accidents faced by boats and fishermen.

5.2. Responsibility and Function:

- 1. Rescue of fishermen & fishing crafts arrested in foreign countries and repatriation of them to the country.
- 2. Rescue of fishermen stranded in local & international waters.
- 3. Providing communication facilities for the exchange of radio signals in between land and vessels, and also carrying out such work.
- 4. Making arrangements to issue licences for communication purposes to the fishing vessels.
- 5. Activation of the first vessel monitoring system.
- 6. Taking action to obtain insurance coverage for the accidents encountered by fishers and fishing boats.

5.3. Progress-2014

<u>5.3.1. Providing communication facilities for the exchange of radio signals in</u> between land and vessels and also carrying out such work.

All these activities are coordinated by the Colombo main Operation Unit through messages received via divisional monitoring centers. Communication facilities were improved and also action has been taken to keep connection between the land and fishing vessels throughout 24 hours.

Also, providing and receiving reports, messages of boat owners, giving inclement weather information as well urgent messages given by boats are carried out by this daily.

Co-ordination of operations in respect of all these tasks is carried out at the head office Colombo. In addition, divisional monitoring centers have been established regionally for this purpose at Kalmunai, Trincomalee, Kalpitiya, Chilaw, Koswadiya, Thoduwawa, Wennappuwa, Negombo, Colombo, Beruwela, Ambalangoda, Hikkaduwa, Galle, Weligama, Mirissa, Devinuwara, Nilwella, Kudawella Tangalle, Kalametiya, Hambanthota and Kirinda.

5.3.2. Taking action to issue licences for communication purposes and call signs to the fishing vessels.

Action was taken to provide call signs for 1465 fishing vessels engaged in fishing operations in high seas so as to comply with international rules and regulations in collaboration with the Telecommunication Regulatory Commission and the Ministry of Defense.

Measures were also taken to provide communication licences for 1465 boats to use radio communication devices in accordance with the international rules and regulations by obtaining applications from boat owners and working in collaboration with the Telecommunication Regulatory Commission.

5.3.3. <u>Taking action to obtain insurance cover in accidents encountered by the fishermen and fishing vessels at sea</u>

In the case of accidents encountered by the fishermen and fishing vessels at sea, all the details provided to the insurance corporations and vessel owners are submitted in the process of obtaining insurance claims by them. Such details are provided in respect of about 50-100 vessels per year. These details are prepared according to the records obtained from the regional offices and Head Office.

In the year 2014, 19 accidents were reported at high seas and 02 fishermen were injured and 06 fishermen died. Also 12 multiday boats and 02 fiberglass boats with outboard engine were destroyed.

All the fishers and fishing boats in the custody of foreign countries except 17 fishers and 03 fishing boats seized by Myanmar were rescued.

Assistance of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Sri Lankan High Commissions and Embassies in the foreign countries was taken in this rescue mission.

5.3.5. Rescue of fishers stranded in local & international waters and at the sea belonging to the foreign countries.

Many of these fishing vessels were stranded at the sea due to engine failures and such vessels were rescued by cargo ships and vessels of the Sri Lanka Navy.

Furthermore, persons who encountered with accidents and fell sick at the sea were taken into land quickly and hospitalized for medical treatment, with the assistance of the Sri Lanka Navy.

5.3.6. Implementation of first vessel monitoring system

The first pilot project of vessel monitoring system was implemented for 50 vessels and monitoring of all such activities, obtaining reports and referring them to the relevant places was also executed. This is the first vessel monitoring system implemented to get the fish export ban lifted by European Union. No any outside officer was recruited for this and the activities of this system have been successfully carried out by the radio officers attached to this unit.

06. Administration Division.

6.1. Responsibilities:-

- To maintain the discipline of the staff including preliminary inquiries and disciplinary inquiries.
- To provide practical training for the students who have followed vocational training courses.
- Transferring the motorbikes which were provided under the ADB project, to the officers concerned.
- Making the staff participate in local and international academic seminars and workshops.
- Provision of communication facilities and its related payments.
- Follow up reporting for duty by staff, leave taking and maintaining of relevant records.
- Issue of railway warrants and seasons and its related payments.
- Matters pertaining to the provision of Agrahara insurance benefits for the staff.
- Delivery of tappal received by the Head office, having registered the same in a record.
- Keeping records on the tappal sent by the Head office and its related payment activities.
- Renting offices, payment of office rents and rates and maintaining records.
- Provision of quarters for the staff, collection of rents and maintenance of records.
- Renting out circuit bungalows, collection of rent, their maintenance and keeping records.
- Granting approval for the payment of loan advances requested by the staff.
- Maintaining records of loans, recovery of outstanding loan balances and write off.
- Repairs and servicing vehicles, marking emblems, issue of fuel, batteries, tires and tubes.
- Disposing of, handing over, obtaining, reserving and registration of vehicles.
- Completing running chart accurately, follow up and maintaining the records of vehicles.




